Statement from DC-CAP President on US Supreme Court Decision on Affirmative Action



I'm deeply disappointed by the Supreme Court's decision today to overturn 45 years of precedent around the importance of diversity in higher education and admissions. As a lawyer, an educator, and a college success advocate, I think it is critical that we be clear-eyed: diversity in higher education is absolutely critical. Our classrooms, neighborhoods, offices, boardrooms, and our democracy are stronger when we have a diverse set of people at the table.

Today the Supreme Court made it that much harder for students of color to have a seat at that table.

Whether it is NAEP scores, youth mental health surveys, or college success data, it's clear that decades of educational progress have been wiped away by COVID-19 and that the gaps for our black, brown, and low-income students are that much worse. We will have to double down our efforts against the status quo to educate and prepare students for the jobs of tomorrow.

While the Supreme Court ruled today that it is unconstitutional for colleges to consider race in their applications, it will never be unconstitutional to donate and support organizations that are trying to make college a reality for students of color.
